9A Superlative facts

Activity type: Speaking and grammar – Quiz – Groups **Aim:** To practise using the superlative forms of adjectives

Language: Comparatives and superlatives – Use at any point from 9.2.

Preparation: Make one copy of the worksheet for every two learners and cut up each

worksheet along the dotted line.

Time: 20 minutes

- Learners sit in groups of four to six, with each group divided into two teams, A and B. Give each team a worksheet matching their letter.
- 2 On each worksheet there are seven questions, each with three possible answers, the correct answer underlined. Each team works together to add the missing superlative forms to the questions using the adjectives in brackets.
- 3 The two teams in each group take it in turn to ask each other questions. Teams should tell each other whether their answers are correct or not, and reveal the correct answer if the answer given is incorrect.
- When both teams have asked all their questions, they add up the number of correct answers given by their opponents in order to establish which is the winning team.

Extension: Comparatives

Ask the teams in each group to swap worksheets. Ask each team to write eight incorrect sentences using superlative forms and based on each question (e.g. 'London is the biggest city in Europe'). When they have finished, ask them to read their sentences to the other team, who have to respond by correcting each one using an appropriate comparative form (e.g. 'No, Moscow is bigger than London'). In this way, learners are given opportunities to practise using comparative forms as well.
