## 7A Unintended consequences

## Activity type: Sentence matching

Aim: To focus on broader possibilities with real-conditional sentences

Language: Conditional sentences – Use any time after 7.2.

**Preparation:** Make enough copies of the worksheet to allow one sentence strip for each learner. Cut up the strips. (Note that each strip has two parts: the beginning of an *if*-clause and the beginning of a consequence or result clause.)

Time: 15 minutes

- 1 Give one strip to each learner. Learners write one complete real-conditional sentence using the two prompts they have on their strip. They then tear their sentence into two parts down the zigzag line.
- 2 Learners mingle to find as many meaningful combinations as possible for their *if*-clause and their result clause. Encourage learners to find explanations/reasons for why an apparently 'wrong' combination might be possible or allowable.

## Extension

Learners each receive a result clause written by another learner and try to come up with a plausible *if*-clause to go with it. Gather whole-class feedback.
