VOCABULARY

Inscribe /in'skraib/

to write or cut words, your name, etc. onto something

- The names of the king and queen were inscribed above the door.

Consensus /kənˈsensəs/

an opinion that all members of a group agree with

- There is a general consensus among teachers about the need for greater security in schools.

Murky /'mairki/

(of a liquid) not clear; dark or dirty with mud or another substance

- She gazed into the murky depths of the water.

Slay /slei/

(old-fashioned or literary) to kill somebody/something in a war or a fight

- St George slew the dragon.

Heroic /həˈrəʊɪk/

showing extreme courage and admired by many people

- She is a heroic figure we can all look up to.

Painstakingly /'peinzteikinli/

in a way that takes a lot of care, effort and attention to detail

- The building has been painstakingly restored to all its former elegance.

Reenact / rix I nækt/

to repeat the actions of a past event, especially as an entertainment

- Members of the English Civil War Society will re-enact the battle.

Revolve /rɪ'vaːlv/

to go in a circle around a central point

- The fan revolved slowly.







Persistence /pər'sıstəns/

the fact of continuing to try to do something despite difficulties, especially when other people are against you and think that you are being annoying or unreasonable

- His persistence was finally rewarded when the insurance company agreed to pay for the damage.

Numerically /nux'merikli/

in a way that is expressed in numbers or is connected with numbers

- We can now express the results numerically.

Qualitative /'kwaxliteitiv/

connected with what something is like or how good it is, rather than with how much of it there is

- There are qualitative differences between the two products.

Twist /twist/

twist something (into something) to bend or turn something into a particular shape

- Her hair was twisted into a knot on top of her head.

Cast out

(literary) to get rid of somebody/something, especially by using force

- He claimed to have the power to cast out demons.

Undeniably / \nndi'naiəbli/

in a way that is true or certain and cannot be denied

- He is, undeniably, an excellent player.

Quirk /kwsirk/

an aspect of somebody's personality or behaviour that is a little strange

- Everyone has their own little quirks and mannerisms.

Bottomless /'bartəmləs/

very deep; seeming to have no bottom or limit

- a bottomless abyss
