- In Part 3, students have to choose one of two tasks: either a letter to an English-speaking friend, or a story for which they are given a title or the opening words.
- The instructions for the letter always say why they are writing and tell them what to write about. It is important that they keep to the topic or they will lose marks. They should not include 'pre-learned' text, which may not fit the topic.
- The subject to be written in the letter about is always a general one so everyone has something to say about it. Students can use their imagination as much as they like,
- The story can be anything which fits the title or beginning given. It can be an everyday incident or a fantasy, provided that it is complete and fits the task given.
- Students should remember to keep their story simple so that it can be completed within the word limit. An incomplete or very overlength story is unlikely to get full marks.
- About 100 words = between 85 and 120 words so students need not worry if they do not write exactly 100.
- Students should be encouraged to make notes and a plan on the exam paper but write their answer directly on the answer sheet to save time and avoid copying errors.

- The Speaking Test is taken in pairs, although if there is an odd number of students, the final three candidates may go in
- There are always two examiners, but only one will interact with the students. The other will make notes, Reassure students that they should not worry about this.
- In Part 1 the examiner will address each student separately, in Parts 2 - 4 the students talk mainly to each other.
- It is essential that students practise in pairs. The exercises are designed to help students get experience of this. It is important for students to know how to ask questions and respond to answers as well as being able to give information
- and opinions. It is very sensible for students to learn useful expressions and vocabulary but it is not advisable for them to prepare whole speeches as they will be penalised for this
- Candidates are assessed on their general ability to communicate. Their pronunciation should be at a level of accuracy that does not impede communication. They are not assessed on their general knowledge or educational level and should be reassured about this. Students should be prepared to talk about everyday subjects in a relaxed atmosphere. They will not be expected to discuss anything outside their own experience.
- The sample Speaking Test is intended to illustrate the format of the test in a realistic way. It offers only an example of the content and scope of possible answers and can be used as a pedagogical tool. Students should not be encouraged to learn the conversations by heart but should be aware of what to expect. It does not contain any student errors in order that it can be used as a model. Students should be reassured that they do not have to speak as fast as these candidates and that they can get very good marks even if they make some grammatical, lexical or phonological errors. This sample test would get full marks.



Speaking Test

Throughout the test, candidates are assessed on their language skills, not their personality, intelligence, or knowledge of the world. They must, however, be prepared to develop the conversation, where appropriate, and respond to the tasks set. Prepared speeches are not acceptable. Candidates are assessed on their own individual performance and not in relation to each other. Both examiners assess the candidates according to oriteria which are interpreted at PET level. The interlocutor awards a mark for global achievement, whilst the assessor awards marks according to four analytical criteria:

- · Grammar and Vocabulary
- · Discourse Management
- Pronunciation
- · Interactive Communication.

Grammar and Vocabulary – This scale refers to the accurate and appropriate use of grammatical forms and vocabulary, It also includes the range of both grammatical forms and vocabulary. Performance is viewed in terms of the overall effectiveness of the language used in dealing with the tasks.

Discourse Management – This scale refers to the coherence, extent and relevance of each candidate's individual contribution. On this scale, the candidate's ability to maintain a coherent flow of language is assessed, either within a single utterance or over a string of utterances. Also assessed here is how relevant the contributions are to what has gone before.

Pronunciation – This scale refers to the candidate's ability to produce comprehensible utterances to fulfill the task requirements. This includes stress, rhythm and intonation, as well as individual sounds. Examiners put themselves in the position of the non-language specialist and assess the overall impact of the pronunciation and the degree of effort required to understand the candidate. Different vairelies of English, e.g. British, North American, Australian etc., are acceptable, provided they are used consistently throughout the test.

Interactive Communication – This scale refers to the candidate's ability to use language to achieve meaningful communication. This includes initiating and responding without undue hesitation, the ability to use interactive strategies to maintain or repair communication, and sensitivity to the norms of turn-taking.

Global Achievement – This scale refers to the candidate's overall effectiveness in dealing with the tasks in the four separate parts of the PET Speaking Test. The global mark is an independent impression mark which reflects the assessment of the candidate's performance from the interlocutor's perspective. The interlocutor gives one global mark for each candidate's performance across all parts of the test.

Marking – As mentioned above, assessment is based on performance in the whole test, and is not related to performance in particular parts of the test. The assessor awards marks for each of the four criteria listed above. The interlocutor awards each candidate one global mark
